
Trial Results Raise Hope of more Effective Pancreatic Cancer Treatment

A major international trial has shown a commonly used chemotherapy drug is as effective at helping prevent pancreatic cancer returning after surgery as the more expensive standard chemotherapy treatment, reveals a study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

The results of the Cancer Research UK- funded study mean the cheaper drug – called 5-fluorouracil (5-FU) - could be prescribed in cases when the standard chemotherapy – gemcitabine - has failed, providing an extra lifeline for patients whose cancer comes back after surgery.

They also raise hopes that a new trial currently underway, looking at combining an oral version of 5-FU with the standard treatment of gemcitabine, could lead to a more effective treatment for pancreatic cancer patients who are eligible for surgery.

Pancreatic cancer is the eleventh most common cancer in the UK, where nearly 7,800 people are diagnosed with the disease each year. But survival rates remain a major concern - only around three per cent of patients survive for more than five years, although five-year survival improves to around ten per cent for patients suitable for surgery.



Lead researcher Professor John Neoptolemos, director of the Liverpool Cancer Research UK Centre, said: "Until now the best way to treat pancreatic cancer has been unclear. But these results are the first to directly compare these two chemotherapies and show undoubtedly that they are both as effective as each other." <u>Read more</u>

This money will support the PCT's work to raise awareness of signs and symptoms of cancer, and to improve early diagnosis in the region. Liverpool FC's Brad Jones speaks of his son's battle with cancer, and unges people to support Anthony Nolan Trust.

Newly signed Liverpool goalkeeper Brad Jones is urging Merseysiders to support the Anthony Nolan Trust, as his son Luca prepares for a transplant. Australia's reserve keeper sacrificed his World Cup dream to rush to four year old Luca's bedside in France. His son was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukaemia earlier this year and is scheduled to undergo bone marrow transplant this month.

Brad is helping to raise awareness about the Anthony Nolan Trust, which finds matches for leukaemia patients who need a lifesaving transplant. He said, "You don't think about these things until it happens to your family, but now i can't think of anything more important."

Brad, who will be sporting the Anthony Nolan logo on his gloves this season continued, "It's easy to join the Anthony Nolan Register, I hope people will sign up or donate and help save more lives."

Kenny Dalglish: How my wife's bravery in cancer battle, gave me strength

In his book My Liverpool Home: Then and Now, Kenny Dalglish, 59, speaks of his family's experience of cancer. "It was March 2003, and I was sitting in the kitchen at home when Marina came home after seeing her consultant. "I've got breast cancer," she said. "I need chemotherapy." I only remember the two Cs, "cancer" and "chemotherapy".



The shock ran through me. A generation earlier and that was you gone, finished, no chance of recovery. But women nowadays are more aware of the threat of breast cancer. The medical people detect it earlier, giving a better chance of survival. Our family coped with that deeply stressful time with resilience and, at times, humour."
