Liverpool PCT urges girls to go for the jab

With cervical cancer currently the focus of a high-profile soap storyline, young women in Merseyside are being encouraged to take a jab which could cut their risk of contracting the disease. As pupils across the city gear up to go back to school, the NHS is issuing a timely reminder to parents to ensure their daughters receive the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) vaccine (also known as the cervical cancer jab) if they're offered it this term. It comes after Eastenders character Tanya Jessop's recent discovery that she has cervical cancer. Cervical cancer kills around 1,000 women in the UK each year. The HPV vaccine protects against the most common high-risk types of HPV which are responsible for about 70% of cervical cancer



cases, so opting for the vaccine could be a life-saving decision. More

Life expectancy for men in Anfield and the surrounding area is on average 10-15 years less than men living in other parts of the UK. Cancer is responsible for many of these early deaths. For the past 12 months the Centre has been supporting a series of local men's health events organised by LFC for Health. LEAD Manager Emma Squibb and Senior Research Nurse Lorraine Turner went along to the second annual celebration event held at Anfield on 22 September. Emma was pleased to meet former Reds star Phil Thompson, who spoke to the audience about his time as a player, and the importance of keeping fit for one's family.

Ginger McCain, the four-time Aintree Grand National winning trainer, has died aged 80 after losing his fight against cancer. The **Southport**-born former taxi driver was highly regarded in the sport for a remarkable talent for spotting and training winners. McCain's greatest achievement was the three-time winner Red Rum, who became a national celebrity in the 1970s, but he had to wait nearly thirty years for Amberleigh House to win in 2004. Tributes have poured in for "Mister Aintree" from admirers and sports personalities. His son Donald has said: "I'd like to think he's a legend. If I can do half as much with my life as he fitted in I won't have done too bad."

Crowded Scouse

A former patient at a Liverpool specialist cancer unit is organising a fund-raising music night to support the research programme of the doctors and nurses who saved his life. Head-On 2011, which takes place on 14th October at the PanAm Bar, is being put on by Vince Killen, a former patient at Aintree University Hospital's Regional Head and Neck Cancer Unit. Vince, 50, from Crosby, was diagnosed with oral cancer in 2005 after he noticed a lump in his neck. He said: "At first I thought it was an inflamed gland, but after five weeks with the lump I started to feel unwell, so I went to my GP. I was referred to Aintree and it was diagnosed as oral cancer."



Vince said: "I've not had any problems for five years which is great, but I don't like to tempt fate by thinking that I've had the 'all clear'." As a keen bass player in the band Crowded Scouse, Vince arranged his first charity gig in 2009. It was such a success that he has held one every year since, attracting crowds of up to 400 and raising over £15,000 in support of Merseyside patient and carer head and neck cancer research.

Professor Simon Rogers, Clinical Director for the Head and Neck Unit at Aintree, said: "Head and neck cancer is one of the few cancers to be increasing in prevalence, including in younger patients, yet there is still a real lack of awareness around it. Vince is proof that it can be beaten so I would encourage everyone to be on the look out for any symptoms."

Head-On takes place on 14th October at PanAm, Albert Dock. Tickets cost £10 in advance and £12 on the door, with all proceeds going towards research and support for patients and carers at the Head and Neck Unit at Aintree University Hospital.
