New £451m Royal Liverpool Hospital 'will go ahead' after legal bid dropped

The £451m rebuild of the Royal will go ahead, it has been announced, after a legal challenge was dropped on February 8th. The challenge, brought by campaign Group KONP (Keep Our NHS Public), was due to be heard in High Court in February, but at the end of January KONP leader Sam Semoff was told by the Legal Services Commission that they would be withdrawing Legal Aid for the case.

A statement from KONP said, "*Mr. Semoff has principles, but very little money. Very reluctantly, on legal advice, he has withdrawn the case.*" The statement went on, "Money will flow out of the NHS to banks and private investors. The excess debt will force cuts in the NHS in Merseyside for the next generation."

The Royal estimates the challenge set plans back by six months and added £1m to the bill. Tony Bell, Chief Executive at the Royal said, "We are absolutely delighted this legal challenge is now over. We are sure the people of Merseyside, who have given so much support to the new Royal, will be pleased to hear this news."

Liverpool City Council Leader Joe Anderson said, "It is fantastic news. Now we can get on with building a hospital that is fit for purpose, creating jobs and apprenticeships." Read More

Emeritus Professor David Price Evans paid a

visit to the Centre on 24th February 2011. Prof Price Evans was Head of Medicine at Liverpool University from 1968 until 1983 and for the period 1972 - 1983 he occupied the Chair of Medicine. He left to become Director of Medicine at the Riyadh Armed Forces Hospital in Saudi Arabia, a position he held for 25 years, and a place where he continues to enjoy a close relationship today.

He is the largest individual donor to the University, endowing two Chairs: the Chair of Medicine was been named in his honour, and in 2005 the Owen and Ellen Evans Chair of Cancer Studies was awarded to Professor John Neoptolemos He is internationally recognised for his work in pharmacogenetics, and has inspired future generations of academics at the University to pursue research into 'personalised medicines'. Liverpool Cancer Conference

Hundreds of international delegates will head to Liverpool for a major conference focusing on the end of life care of cancer patients.

The OPCARE9 Conference at the BT Convention Centre, on Tuesday 9th March marks the completion of a three-year European Commission 7th Framework project involving clinicians, academics, and researchers from nine countries across the world.

The project has been co-ordinated by the **Marie Curie Palliative Care Institute** Liverpool (MCPCIL) which is also the UK representative. <u>More</u>

New Life Saving Equipment in Liverpool

The £2.3m radiotherapy device, called the Novalis Tx , was unveiled in February, at Liverpool's new Clatterbridge Cancer Centre, next to the Walton Centre in Fazakerley. The pioneering machine could save the lives of patients with inoperable brain tumours. It can perform precise and painless treatments in a single visit without damaging surrounding brain tissue. It can also be used on tumours in other parts of the body.

Mr Mohsen Javadpour, Consultant Neurosurgeon at The Walton Centre, said: "The technology allows us to track and treat difficult-to-treat cancers such as tumours really deep in the brain where open surgery is too dangerous. Another great benefit of the knifeless Novalis Tx treatment over open brain surgery is the incredibly reduced recovery times for patients. Most treatments can be performed as a day case or will require a minimum hospital stay."

The machine will be run by Clatterbridge Centre for Oncology and reduce travel times for cancer patients living north of the River Mersey. Dr Brian Haylock, Consultant Oncologist and Clinical Director for Radiotherapy at Clatterbridge Centre for Oncology, said the radiotherapy machine has potential to be very widely used: *"Unlike some other highly specialised radiation treatment machines, the Novalis Tx can treat many different types of cancer all over the body, allowing us to treat more cancer patients with a single device."* <u>Read more</u>

A Year in the Life of a Donation Station









The Centre has 3 Donation Stations: DSO General Office, CRC Foyer, Duncan Building Foyer. Bags are worth up to £30 each.

- Our local CRUK delivery driver Darren collects the bags from the Centre and takes them to one of the local shops.
- The shop manager goes through the bags to give each one an average value.
- The stock is then sorted and priced by volunteers and put out for sale.
- Items which do not sell within a certain time are taken to another local shop for sale.
- Clothes which cannot be re-sold in the shop are sold to a recycling merchant, last year creating £4m income for CRUK.
- Last year CRUK's 600 shops generated income of £65 million
