Thanks to local boy Jack Porter for raising funds for CRUK by taking part in the 60 mile Manchester to Blackpool bike ride. **Professor John Ellershaw** has been awarded an Honorary Doctorate at Edge Hill University in recognition of his contribution to medicine. The citation delivered by the Dean of the Faculty of Health highlighted Professor Ellershaw's contribution to improving care of the dying and his impact on the Medical Undergraduate Curriculum at Liverpool University. The Marie Curie Palliative Care Institute at the University of Liverpool has ongoing collaborations with Edge Hill University, contributing to the Palliative Care Education in Nursing and collaborative research with Professor Barbara Jack who is Head of Research and Scholarship.

Professor John Ellershaw said, "I'm both honoured and delighted to have received this award which has been made possible through the support of many professional colleagues and the wider political and societal realisation that end of life care is everybody's business."



Lung Cancer screening pilot begins in Liverpool

Doctors hope a project at Liverpool University could significantly cut deaths caused by lung cancer. Researchers are approaching more than 85,000 participants from Merseyside and other parts of the UK to take part. The pilot project will investigate whether a national lung cancer screening programme could be started up.

People aged between 50 and 75, chosen at random, from Liverpool, Sefton and Knowsley, will get letters asking them to take part in the trial and to respond to a questionnaire. Those selected will be invited to Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital, where they will be randomly selected to receive, or not receive, a CT-Scan. They will then be monitored for early signs of lung cancer.

Professor John Field, Chief Investigator of UK Lung Screening (UKLS), said: "Although the number of deaths from lung cancer is falling, it still kills more than 35,000 people each year in the UK, which is more than any other cancer." The success of CT screening trials could potentially lead to the implementation of a national lung cancer screening programme, which could have an enormous impact on the future of all lung cancer treatment strategies.

"We could see significant changes in managing the disease, similar to the impact of breast screening over the last 15 years."

Liverpool swimming Olympian Stephen Parry braves Irish Sea to be charity splash hit

Liverpool Olympian swimmer Stephen Parry was among a team of celebrities making a splash in the chilly Irish Sea for charity. The Allerton-born Olympic bronze medallist took the plunge for a gruelling 56-mile relay from Holyhead to Dublin. He was joined in the water by members of the public and celebrities including singer Ronan Keating, former Atomic Kitten Jenny Frost and Strictly Come Dancing star Pamela Stephenson for the challenging swim, which aims to raise £1m for Cancer Research UK.

During their epic 40-hour crossing, the swimmers will face sharks, jellyfish and strong currents. Steve said: *"My dad's had cancer, my sister-in-law died of cancer when she was 33 and I had testicular cancer myself 18 months ago, so this is a fantastic opportunity to do something for a great cause."* <u>More</u>

Isle of Man Relay raises money for CRUK in Liverpool

430 people including about 27 cancer survivors took part in the island's second Relay for Life – to honour cancer survivors and celebrate life. The 24-hour relay started at midday on Saturday 27 August and saw at least one member of each of the 29 teams walking on the NSC track at all times. So far, about £21,000 has been raised for Cancer Research UK – where the money will go to the Liverpool Cancer Research UK Centre. The event's chairman, Gaynor Haxby, said: '*It is similar to the amount we had raised by this time last year. We went on to raise £44,000 so hopefully we will get somewhere close to that in the next few weeks.*' Liverpool based researcher Amro Ebbiary, who went to the first Relay last year, went along to support the event again this year. <u>more</u>
